


Over 3,800 animals received expert care at PASA Sanctuaries




Parrots Find Sanctuary




Asuquo Nsa Ani

important ape habitat






Monitoring wild chimpanzees

Tacugama Chimpanzee Sanctuary is conducting crucial monitoring of wild chimpanzee populations in the forest of Sierra Leone. By collecting data on wild populations and the threats they face, PASA members can implement more effective measures to conserve them and their habitiats.

Protecting Habitat and Helping Communities

At PASA member Limbe Wildlife Centre beside Mount Cameroon National Park, the Green Project pays local women farmers and former hunters to sustainably harvest leaves and forest plants - no new land is cleared. Those greens feed rescued primates, while the steady income keeps people from hunting or cutting the forest, protecting this important habitat.

Reducing humanchimpanzee conflict

New boreholes in Uganda's Kagadi District now provide safe, nearby water to residents, ending risky trips into chimpanzee habitat. This access has the potential to greatly reduce human-chimpanzee conflict, protecting both community health and endangered apes.

6 PASA members across Africa are involved in reforestation efforts








Regenerating Forests

Colobus Conservation in Kenya succeeded in planting 10,000 seedlings to help restore indigenous coastal forest, with an 80% survival rate.

PASA members released over 40 primates to the wild in 2024

PPG in Gabon recorded the birth of two gorillas fathered by a reintroduced male, a milestone in gorilla conservation.
